

PRESIDENT'S CORNER





For as long as I can remember,

all I've wanted to do is be around horses. Whenever I saw horses in fields or photos, I would plead, bargain, even cry to convince my parents to let me ride. They finally took me on a trail ride in the Black Hills when I was five. I rode a horse named Sugar, who plodded around calmly with me on his back; but to me, he was a valiant and fiery steed who could take me anywhere I wanted to go. I was officially hooked on horses.

Once home, I became more insistent about riding. My parents finally relented and we began to search for a place for me to take lessons, with the agreement that we would never own a horse and I would certainly never compete. I had just turned six when we found trainer Anna Dobos at

the Minnesota Horse and Hunt Club. I began taking lessons on a horse named "Tiger", a 14.3 hand Quarter Horse, and fell even more in love with horses and riding. Less than a year after I started riding, Tiger was my horse and I was showing at schooling shows and local MHJA shows.

My parents still sometimes wonder what happened to our "simple guidelines." The next year, I began showing at the "A" rated shows, including the Midstates Horse Shows. I showed Tiger in the 11 and under as well as the 17 and under divisions for a little under five years before we retired him.

When I was 12, another of Anna's students, Carol Greeman, asked me to show her horse "What About Me," an OTTB gelding. I showed him in the 17 and under division as well as several Children's Hunter classes – it was a fun learning experience. After that show season, it was

a fun learning experience. After that show season, it was time for me to find my own horse to show again. In the fall of 2006, Anna contacted a friend of hers about bringing over some horses for me to try. Among them was a quirky

little Oldenburg gelding named "Art of Bronze." At the time, he had been trained to do everything but jumping - he could do dressage, pull carts and logs, even jump in the back of a pick-up truck! Despite his greenness, he and I got along beautifully and we had soon added a second horse to the Bentfield family. After a winter of intense training, Bronze and I began to compete in the 17 and under division. I was also

offered an opportunity to try

the jumpers on a wonderful horse named "Sam Sr.," who was owned by Pat Noone and boarded at Wyndem Rose

Stables (now Ridge Road Stables). In the summer of 2008, I showed another jumper named "Ballroom Blitz" and moved up to the Children's Hunters on Bronze. I also moved my horses to Wyndem Rose during that time.

In the fall of that same year, I was given yet another fantastic jumper opportunity when Dr. Kathy Ott offered my family a lease on a mare named "Serafina." I showed her in Low Children's in the 2009 season, placing

as reserve champion at the MHJA Year-End Banquet. During that season, I also began showing Bronze in the Junior Hunter Division. In February 2010, we at Wyndem soon received the sad news that Anna would be moving to

California with her husband, Jason. We were all fortunate to find a new trainer, Seth Clayton. He is a wonderful trainer who encourages and drives us to be the best that we can be – lessons are always a lot of work, yet also

exceptionally fun.

In the 2010 season, I continued to show Bronze in the Junior Hunters and 15-17 Equitation. We even had the opportunity to compete in the East Coast Junior Hunter Finals in Lexington, KY, where we did quite well! It was an absolutely amazing and memorable experience. I continued to ride Serafina, moving up to the High Children's Division and competing in a few Modified Junior/Amateur classes. We did quite well

that year – at the MHJA Banquet I was Champion with Serafina in the High Children's and Champion with

Bronze in the Small Junior Hunters, and we received several perpetual trophies. We also placed well in the Zone, with Bronze as Champion for Small Junior Hunter 16-17 and Fina as Reserve Champion in High Children's.

The 2011 season was my last season as a junior rider. Throughout the year I showed Bronze in the Small Junior Hunters, 15-17 Equitation, and several Hunter Derbies including our first International

Hunter Derby, where we placed 8th out of 22 horses. It was an overall great year, and I am glad that I was able to end my junior riding years on such a good note.

2011 MHJA OPEN MEETING


This meeting was my last job as president, and at first, I was going to let reporting on it ride until the next newsletter. That is, until I got my January issue of America's Horse, the national magazine for AQHA members, and read their President's message. It was a perfect metaphor for our Open Meeting.

"At the 2011 AQHA Convention, the Youth Committee and the AQHA Board of Directors agreed that the Association needs to focus more attention on the youth segment of its membership. At 28,000 members, the AQH Youth Association is one of the largest youth equine associations in the world. About 9,000...of those members actually show or compete with those horses.

But what we're finding is that we're having a hard time attracting kids from outside the industry.

We're not getting kids early enough, and by the time they're old enough to enter our organization or any

EQUINE DEWORMING DEMYSTIFIED

Why shouldn't I follow an every-other-month Why shouldn't I tollow deworming schedule?

Over-the-counter equine paste dewormers have been on the market for several decades now. When they were first available, the drugs were very effective against most equine parasites. We thought that rotating the drug classes would keep worms from developing resistance against any one drug—and that method worked for a while. But now, we are seeing more resistance than ever to some of our most tried and true dewormers. Just like bacteria are developing resistance to some of our most common antibiotics, parasites are evolving to be hardier. And unfortunately, there are no new deworming drugs on the horizon. To preserve the effectiveness of the deworming drugs we have, we must actually decrease the amount that they are used. In our new recommendations, each horse will only need to be dewormed 2-5 times per year, depending on its individual worm load.

How do I know how many times to deworm each individual horse?

Each horse should be classified according to its egg-shedding status. egg-shedding status. Horses are classified as "low," "medium" or "high" shedders. "Low shedders" have a naturally good immunity against parasites. "High shedders" are horses with poor natural immunity against parasites OR horses that have a poor or nonexistent deworming history (many neglected horses fall into this category). A horse's shedding status is determined by doing fecal egg counts, a laboratory test done on fresh manure. Counts are measured in "eggs per gram" (epg) of manure. Horses tend to remain

in one category throughout their lives (with the exception of foals and neglected animals) so once a horse's shedding status is determined, it can generally be dewormed accordingly, with periodic fecal egg count rechecks. This is also why it is not sufficient to test only one manure sample in each paddock—each horse can be very different, even if they are exposed to the same parasites.

My horse is a low shedder with an egg count of 150 eggs per gram. I'm not supposed to deworm him now, but I don't want him to have ANY parasites! Why shouldn't I deworm?

It sounds counterintuitive, but we actually WANT horses to have a small population of worms that are susceptible to dewormers. Low egg counts will not negatively impact health.

Consider how deworming works: Horses can have millions of parasites at a time. When we deworm a horse, most of those parasites are killed. The ones left over weren't killed because their genetics rendered them resistant to the drug that was used. Those resistant worms are the ones left to reproduce! They pass along their drug-resistance genes to the next generation of worms, and the process repeats itself. Over time, you can be left with a population of worms that is totally resistant to certain drugs.

For this reason, we need to allow some of those nonresistant parasites to reproduce, so that our drugs remain effective against them and their offspring.

To which drugs are parasites becoming the most resistant?

Small strongyles are developing resistance to the pyrantel family of drugs, as well as fenbendazole and

Ascarids (roundworms) are developing resistance to ivermectin and moxidectin.

Tapeworms are developing resistance to the pyrantel family. We previously recommended using a "double dose" of pyrantel to kill tapeworms, but praziquantel, included in some deworming pastes, is better for killing tapeworms.

Resistance is often location or farm-specific. It is important to know if your farm's parasite population is resistant to certain drugs.

It is NOT TRUE that cold temperatures kill parasites. Many survive winter even in Minnesota! Some, however, are killed by high, dry temperatures.


Can you define low, medium and high shedders?

LOW SHEDDERS: <200 eggs per gram

Low-shedding horses have a good natural immunity to internal parasites, and will rarely have problems with large or small strongyles or roundworms. Deworming 2-3 times per year is sufficient for these horses; make sure to deworm for tapeworms in the spring and fall (use something with praziquantel) and for encysted small strongyles (moxidectin or a Panacur PowerPac). Horses with an unknown or nonexistent deworming history that initially present with a high egg count may become "low shedders" once their parasite load is reduced. Monitor with fecals twice yearly.

MEDIUM SHEDDERS: 200-500 epg

These horses have a marginal natural immunity to parasites and need a little extra help keeping their worm loads in check. Deworm 3-4 times yearly and monitor fecal egg counts twice yearly, and two weeks after deworming if you or your vet are concerned about resistance. As with low shedders, be sure to deworm for tapeworms twice yearly and for encysted small strongyles once yearly.



HIGH SHEDDERS: >500 epg

High-shedding horses do not have optimal natural immunity against internal parasites. They probably make up less than 25% of the equine population, but contribute the most to the parasite population. Deworm these horses 4-5 times per year, and check fecals 2-3 times per year. Be vigilant about monitoring resistance to specific drugs by performing fecals two weeks after deworming if there is any concern. *NOTE: Horses with an unknown or nonexistent deworming history may initially present with a very high parasite load, but may not remain high shedders once they have been carefully treated.

What about deworming foals?

Foals and young horses (especially under 1 year) are a "special deworming case" because they are much more susceptible to roundworms than older horses. We recommend deworming the mare about a day after giving birth. Deworm the foal every month, rotating between pyrantel (such as Strongid®) and ivermectin. DO NOT use moxidectin (Quest®) in horses under 6 months of age. After 1 year of monthly deworming, young horses can be transitioned to a more adult schedule, but continue to monitor fecal egg counts, especially for roundworms.

How do you deworm a horse you suspect has an extreme parasite load?

Horses with an unknown, insufficient or nonexistent deworming history must be treated carefully, especially if roundworms are present. A massive die-off of worms can lead to intestinal impactions (roundworms) and endotoxemia (strongyles). It is important to start with a fecal egg count and work with your vet to determine the best deworming plan for the parasites the horse has. We often start with a partial dose of fenbendazole that will not kill all of the parasites. Please consult your vet if you suspect a high parasite load!

This sounds expensive. At what point does the vet need to be involved?

It is true that for a few horses, the new method of parasite control will be a live parasite control will be a bit more expensive and complex than the "rotate dewormers every other month" strategy. But for many horses, the process will be less expensive and require fewer treatments. And for ALL horses, the new recommendations will result in healthier horses and more effective dewormers in the coming years.

We recommend checking fecal egg counts at spring and fall vaccine appointments. You can collect any additional samples yourself and bring them in for evaluation. We want to encourage an open discussion between you and your

vet to come up with the best deworming strategy for your individual horse or horses!

COLLECTING SAMPLES: Fecal samples should be fresh (within 2 hours of being passed). They should be collected in an airtight plastic baggie, refrigerated and brought in for evaluation within 24 hours. This prevents eggs from hatching, which can give falsely low egg counts.

What are some of the more common equine parasites?

Small strongyles (threadworms): Most common parasite of adult horses; resistance developing most quickly. Can survive freezing!

Encysted small strongyles: Life stage of small strongyles when they are burrowed in intestinal lining. Cause severe damage when they emerge. Not detectable on fecal egg counts.

Roundworms (Ascarids): Migrate to blood vessels, liver and lungs. Mostly young horses; can cause small intestinal impactions.

Bots: Eggs eaten off grass and hair; larvae live in stomach lining and can cause ulcers. Not detectable on fecal egg counts.

Tapeworms: Can cause colic, digestive problems and weight loss. Common in Minnesota. Usually not detectable on fecal egg counts.

Large strongyles (bloodworms): Migrate from intestine to large arteries. Largely eradicated on many farms; easily killed by most dewormers.

Pinworms: Cause itchiness and tail rubbing.

Lungworms: Found primarily in donkeys.

Which brands use which deworming drug?

Ivermectin: IverCare®, Zimecterin®, Equimectrin®, Rotectin®, Equell®, etc.

Ivermectin/Praziquantel: Equimax®, Zimecterin Gold®

Moxidectin: Quest®

Moxidectin/Praziquantel: Quest Plus® (currently not available due to manufacturer backorder)

Pyrantel pamoate: Strongid®, Exodus®, Rotectin P®, StrongyleCare®, etc.

Fenbendazole: Panacur®, SafeGuard®

Oxibendazole: Anthelcide EQ®





competition in general, they're already invested in other activities. This may not appear to be a problem right now, but down the road 10, 20, 30, or 40 years from now, these kids are the future of our industry and the future leaders of AQHA."—AQHA President Peter J. Cofrancesco III, in the January/February issue of America's Horse.

It's nice to know the MHJA is not alone in this predicament, and Mr. Cofrancesco's statement covers the two most discussed topics of the open Meeting: the Harvest Horse Show, and the need for the MHJA to reach those showing on an unrecognized level.

One of the reasons that the MHJA wants to continue its support the Harvest Show is that it is a showcase for our discipline. As Greg Novak put it, "Do we want Jane and John Q. Public and their kids to be able to come to the Harvest Show and decide that this is the kind of riding they want to do; or do we stop and they go to the AQHA show and decide that's what they want to ride?" Obviously, we would prefer that they try hunters and jumpers.

Which led to the next topic of discussion—what can the

MHJA offer to people already riding, but not necessarily participating in the MHJA or MHJA approved shows? At this point, the MHJA does have By-Laws that prohibit us from approving non-USEF recognized shows, but that doesn't mean the MHJA can't look at other ways to attract people. Stephanie Greeninger and Missy Fedor brought forward some ideas and Tracy Grandstrand will be looking at ways to incorporate these ideas into the MHJA model.

I want to thank all the non-Board MHJA members who attended; we had 23, which is the largest attendance we've had in many years. The meeting led to valuable input to the Board, which is extremely helpful. I hope, in return, the members who attended also got more information as to how and why the Board operates.

I also want to thank the Board members who brought the food and beverages which were enjoyed by all, especially John Puckett, who provided wonderful Punch pizzas for the meeting, even though he was unable to attend.





2012 MHJA MEMBERSHIP APPLICATION

Welcome to the MHJA! For 2012 there are 2 types of individual memberships:

- Competing Membership: Dues of \$60.00 per year. A competing member is entitled to receive all the publications and prize lists, be listed in the directory, participate in MHJA Clinics as a member, and all other regular member benefits, plus the Competing Member and all horses owned by the Competing Member will be eligible for MHJA Year-End Awards. In order to be eligible for a year-end award in the hunter or jumper classes, the owner of the horse must be an MHJA Competing Member. If you are riding a leased horse, please be sure the owner is an MHJA member in order for points to count. To be eligible for an equitation award, the rider must be an MHJA Competing Member.
- Sustaining Membership: Dues of \$40.00 per year. A sustaining member is entitled to receive all the publications and prize lists, be listed in the directory, participate in MHJA Clinics as a member and all other regular benefits, except that the Sustaining Membership *does not* include eligibility for year-end awards.

Both memberships are from December 1 to November 30, the same as USEF and USHJA. Membership becomes active on its postmark date if mailed or date received by a representative of the MHJA if hand delivered. All memberships expire on November 30, regardless of the date activated. The 2011 membership list will be purged on March 1, 2012. If you have not renewed or joined by then, you will not receive any more mailings or be listed in the 2012 directory. The MHJA sends reminders before the March 1 deadline. It is the member's responsibility to make sure all the membership requirements are met for eligibility for awards.
